Lent moves on its way. Great that next weekend our four Masses will be restored. A fitting day, **Laetare**, for as in mid Advent, **Gaudete**, the Entrance Antiphon is 'Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all you who love her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning, exult and be satisfied at her consoling breast.' It is also Mothering Sunday. Our rejoicing continues as this year we will be able to keep a modified celebration of the Easter Triduum. 1st - 4th April.

Maundy Thursday, Mass of The Lord's Supper 7 pm. Good Friday Liturgy 3 p.m. the Easter Vigil, at 8 p.m. Easter Day Masses 9 a.m. St Ives, and 11 a.m. Penzance and also Hayle 11 a.m. (Note: No Saturday Vigil 5 pm or 6.30 on Holy Saturday, 3rd. Only Vigil is 8 p.m. Penzance)

As with Christmas if you are at the Easter Vigil you should not be there on Easter Day, to give others a seat. None of these Masses/Liturgy should be more than an hour this year, most will be far less. Once more details are sent to me, I will be able to give you more information.

The Lenten Sunday Liturgy of the Word conducts the Christian through a scriptural symphony. Old Testament Readings develop the theme of the first movement: God's covenants within history, progressively promising fuller life, moving from Noah, to Abraham, to Moses, the Exile, Jeremiah and the new covenant. The second movement is composed of New Testament readings: exhortation in the exercises of the life of grace lived now. The third movement, Gospel readings, harmonizes the themes of life promised and life lived with proclamations of significant episodes in the Messiah's progress, making possible the fulfilment in the Paschal finale.

'Patris Corde: With a Father's Heart' the Apostolic Letter of Pope Francis declaring the year of St Joseph. Earlier in the year I printed a section of it. Here is another, which I hope you find helpful reading

A creatively courageous Father. *If at times God seems not to help us, surely this does not mean that we have been abandoned, but instead are being trusted to plan, to be creative, and to find solutions ourselves. That kind of creative courage was shown by the friends of the paralytic, who lowered him from the roof in order to bring him to Jesus (Lk 5:17-26). Difficulties did not stand in the way of those friends' boldness and persistence. Jesus recognised their creative faith with which they sought to bring their sick friend to him. The Gospel does not tell us how long Mary, Joseph and the child remained in Egypt. Yet they certainly needed to eat, to find a home and employment. It does not take much imagination to fill in those details. The Holy Family had to face concrete problems like every other family, like so many of our migrant brothers and sisters, who today risk their lives to escape misfortune and hunger. In this regard, I consider St Joseph the special patron of all forced to leave their native lands because of war, hatred, persecution and poverty.*

At the end of every account in which Joseph plays a role, the gospel tells us that he gets up, takes the child and his mother and does what God commanded him (Mt 1:24; 2:14, 21) Indeed, Jesus and Mary his mother are the most precious treasure of our faith. In the divine plan of salvation, the Son is inseparable from his Mother, from Mary, who 'advanced in her pilgrimage of faith, and faithfully persevered in her union with her Son until she stood at the cross.'

We should always consider whether we ourselves are protecting Jesus and Mary, for they are also mysteriously entrusted to our own responsibility, care and safekeeping.
