CAFOD & Seeds and the World Bank.

The world is facing a food crisis. Climate Change, Covid19, and the war in Ukraine and elsewhere mean that millions of people do not have enough food. Even here we are feeling the impact of this. CAFOD works with small farmers around the world who produce lots of the world's food.

But many of them are facing a huge problem.

For hundreds of years they have freely used and shared their own seeds, but laws are being passed that limit what they are allowed to do with their own seeds, giving them little choice but to buy more expensive seeds from large companies. These laws make it even harder for small farmers and their families to produce enough food. Salina is a small farmer from Bangladesh and she told CAFOD "to keep the seeds in our own hands is the main thing. With out seeds, being a farmer is not possible."

Small farmers are doing important work protecting God's creation and ensuring that seeds are used to feed us all.

In Genesis, God says, "See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the earth, and every tree with seed as its fruit; you shall have them for food." That is why Salina is writing a letter to the World Bank, which has a lot of influence over agricultural issues, asking them to protect the rights of small farmers to use and share their own seeds.

Next weekend please sign Salina's letter. By this we can send a strong message to the World Bank that the Catholic Community stands with small-scale farmers.

St Charbel Makhlof, 1828-1898, 24th July. Hailing from Lebanon Charbel was a priest and monk in the Maronite Church, a self-governing Eastern Catholic Church in communion with Rome. Charbel acquired a wide reputation for holiness during his lifetime, and for promoting peaceful dialogue between Christians and Muslims. One of five children he was born in the Lebanese mountains and raised in a devout Maronite home. He received the habit at the Monastery of St Maron in Annaya and made his solemn vows in 1853. He was sent to the seminary of Ss Cyprian & Justina in Kfifan to prepare for holy orders; after ordination returned to his monastery, where he spent the rest of his life in prayer and self-mortification. In 1875, he entered the eremitical life, and lived alone in a hermitage belonging to his monastery. After his death in 1898 he became known as a powerful intercessor- "the miracle monk of Lebanon" and miraculous events are reported to have taken place at his tomb. St Pope Paul VI beatified him in 1965 and he was canonised in 1977. His feast day is kept in the west on 24 July, and in the east on the third Sunday in July. (from this month's Catholic Herald: Saint of the month) His statue is in St Joseph's Hayle all this month. *Parishioners Magellan, Sophie, Sebastian and Florence Makhlof are close relatives.*
